How to Play



18. Walk to the Weir. The new building generates hydro-electric power. An information board gives you a lot of information about the weir. How many homes is it designed to create power for? 19. An invention of which Ancient Greek scientist is used to generate power?


Attention!

This route requires you to cross busy roads, an active railway line and use paths that can be slippery & muddy in the wet. Parental supervision required. 1. Start at the Old Church Rooms, to the right is a red brick and tile house, Ty Mynydd Lodge, it has the only blue plaque in Radyr and Morganstown, which author does the plaque commemorate?

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20. You can see many kinds of birds at the weir, herons, ducks cormorants and occasionally a very bright blue bird. They show this bird on the information board. What is its name? 21. Walk up the Taff trail, under the motorway to a footbridge over the river. This was built to take the tramway across the river. Before that the iron made in Pentyrch was loaded onto barges and floated down the river to Melingriffith. The bridge is called after the Elizabethan farm just after the bridge, Gelynis. From the bridge you get a lovely view of Castle Coch. Rstored by the Marquis of Bute in the 19th century. It grew an unusual crop in the field under the castle. You'll get a clue as to what the crop was in the field on your left just after Gelynis Farm. What was the crop?

2. The Old Church Rooms was the first school in R&M. When the Primary School was built it was reused by the Church. Its name is above the door in the car park. What is the Welsh version of the name?





22. Cross the railway with great care and go up the steps to the main road. Cross the road at the pedestrian crossing and go up Chapel Road. The chapel is on your right. When was it built?

Go up Chapel Road to the top and take the footpath which crosses the field and follows the side of the motorway to a footbridge. Cross the motorway. Turn right at the Guide Centre. Turn left onto Caer Craig towards Bryn Deri primary school and first right into Pentwyn. Continue until you get to the park. Take the alley on your right just as the park starts which brings you out into Dan y Bryn Avenue. Next left takes you into Windsor Avenue which returns you to Park Road and the Old Church Rooms.

5. Walk to the post box, in the reign of which king was it installed?

6. Go left along Windsor Avenue until you get to Drysgol Road. Take a detour to the Golf Club car park. On the wall above the car park it gives the year that the Golf Club was started. When was it started? 7. Return to Windsor Avenue and walk down to the village. A stone in Windsor Gardens commemorates R&M Twinning with where? 12. Head down to the station. You'll usually see some strange animals in the field on your right. If they are there, what are they?

13. Head to the tunnel under the railway line. The railway was first built for the Taff Vale Railway by Isambard Kingdom Brunel. The first narrow gauge railway that he built. He favoured an 8 ft gauge. The first railway line was single track. It has been widened several times and you can see the different phases in the tunnel itself. How many phases?



16. Walk along the Trail, be careful of bicycles. Just before you get to the weir there is a piece of metal trackway in the grass on your right. This is part of a tramway, later a railway that linked Gwaelod y Garth to Whitchurch. What does it say on this piece of track?
